Many of you know we've been in the commercial cow/calf business for over 100 years. Our journey to Billings and into



registered red angus cattle came through Crump Red Angus in Arvada, Wyoming. It was there we became believers in the Red Angus breed. We'd purchased many bulls out of Crump sales, and then partnered with them to utilize many of our commercial cows as recip/surrogate mothers of some high-end genetic embryos. Our son, Jason, raised

many of the Crump Bulls you may have purchased in the past.




Once you see them, you'll understand why we're so excited about the diversity in our breeding program. We have sires that are proven, and we believe the quality of our bulls has never been better.

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- 2. Name a breed of cattle that can produce sale topping steers due to their gainability and carcass traits while at the same time producing heifer mates that outsell those steers.
- 3. Name a breed of cattle that produces balanced traits in all areas without the need for cross breeding.
- 4. If a beef producer does choose to crossbreed, name one breed that compliments any other breed.

The answer? Red Angus.

Take it one step further and ask those who know, "What brand has come to mean quality with results on the bottom line?"

The answer for over a decade was the Crump line of bulls. McCann Red Angus has taken the best from the Crump line and merged that with their new sires to bring you the best bulls offered this year.

The Red Angus breed has been focused on maternal traits since it's inception, and a result of this solid foundation, where ever Red Angus breeders across our nation are found, you can be sure to find a quality set of animals.

Now at the risk of saying something that goes without saying, structural correctness and good feet are imperative.

The Crump family understood that common sense principle, running their cattle in large pastures in the rough Powder River breaks, where they found Mother Nature did much of the culling.

For you, the decision in choosing a seed stock producer should therefore include finding a breeder with similar goals as yours, a rancher who raises cattle in country similar to where your cattle will run, under feed conditions similar to what your management provides. Only then can you be confident that the performance observed in bulls that you are interested in will most likely be replicated in your herd.

One of the Crump cornerstones was to "make our cows work for us instead of us working for them, thereby are ensuring that cattle with traits relative to our customers profitability will rise to the top while higher maintenance, lesser producing cattle fall out and their genetics are not passed on."

McCann Red Angus added to the legend by fostering an appreciation that the profitability of anyone who uses their genetics is first and foremost in their minds.

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Meet the McCanns

If the McCann Corporation had a boardroom (we don't), and if there were an "Our Founder" portrait on the wall (there isn't

one of those either), claim to that title would likely go to Bill's grandfather, Joseph P. McCann, who owned and operated a saw mill in Wisconsin in the

late 1800s. With his supply of Wisconsin lumber running low, he began looking for a new business location, visiting the Lewiston, Idaho area several times in the process between 1900-1904. Something about the region struck him, and he moved his wife and four children to Lewiston, Idaho in 1907. There, he and his wife added four more children to their family. Bill's father, William V. McCann, the youngest boy was born in 1911.


Upon arrival, Joseph decided against starting a new sawmill and instead, started a farming and ranching operation. He purchased substantial amounts of property in both Nez Perce County (the Lewiston area) and Lewis County (the Craig Mountain area) where he farmed, ranched, and raised his family.

After he passed away, the property and assets were distributed among their 8 children. Bill's father, William V. McCann received property both in Lewiston and on the Craig Mountain. He later purchased a ranch outside of Bovill, Idaho. In 1941, William married Gertrude Hoss, a farm girl from Craigmont. Together, they farmed and ranched and raised two sons, incorporating their operation in 1974 under the name of McCann Ranch & Livestock, Co. Even then, it was a family concern, operating a small 150 cow/calf commercial op-

eration with a polled Herford, Red Angus base crossed with a Shorthorn or two. William and a hired man took care of the day to day needs of the cattle, while his son, William "Bill Jr." McCann took care of the business side of things. Later, Bill Jr. and his wife Lori along with their children, Mindy, Bill III, Jason and Aaron helped with branding, hauling and stacking hay, and whatever else was needed around the ranch.

William passed away in 1997, leaving Bill Jr., Lori, and their son, Jason to take over full operations. By that time, their other children were off to college, marriage, and raising their

own children outside of Idaho. But the inevitable change in leadership right away established a goal to increase the vigor of the herd. to increase the pounds on the

animals, and to build a stronger base.

Today, much of the original McCann land remains intact as a farming and ranching business with some commercial rental properties. The ranching operation sits along the banks of the Clearwater River outside of Lewiston, along with some property on the main North and South corridor of Lewiston. The town property was designated as the bull pasture, while land located above and running to the banks of the Salmon River outside the quaint town of Keuterville along with the original Bovill ranch on Craig Mountain became Summer pasture ground

We grew from that small 150 head to over 360 head of commercial cows.

About the same time, the McCann's started breeding Wagyu bulls to the first calf heifers for their calving ease and premium price. It was natural, then, to begin purchasing higher quality bulls and culling out animals for bad dispositions, bad teeth, and bad bags.

Then, about 9 years ago, as Jason was researching quality Red Angus bulls to continue developing the herd, he found the Crump program. In a deliberate move, Crump bulls were acquired, and the family watched their herd improve immediately. Mothers had better milk production and raised bigger and stronger calves, which turned into better profits upon weaning and selling.

It was a blessing in disguise, building a great working relationship with the Crump family, because they asked the McCanns to partner with them in their embryo program. Of course, the answer was, "YES!" Approximately 75 of McCann's commercial cows acted as surrogate mothers to bulls and heifers., and they were able to purchase some excellent replacement heifers and sell the bulls raised at the Crump sale for a percentage of the profit.

Unplanned, the McCann's grew to deeply care for the Crump family. So, when they were approached by the Crumps in October of 2020 to see if they would be interested in purchasing the herd, McCanns immediately went to work to secure financing to make it happen.

2020, two McCann semis along with seven others met at the Crump Ranch in Arvada, Wyoming. It was a bittersweet day for everyone as the convoy began bringing the herd to their new home in Lewiston, Idaho. But as the trucks pulled away from the Crump Ranch on their way to a new home, every one of the McCann family knew the Crump family would remain near and dear. Bill, Jr., Lori, Jason, and the rest of the family cannot possibly express their appreciation all the help and support they received from the Crump crew.

As the McCann operation began to evolve, so too did the circle of help. Almost immediately, new relationships were developed with great help and advice from many of you as the McCann's began to learn the ropes of putting on a registered bull sale.

With all the expansion and change from the days of Joseph ("Our Founder"), the business is still, truly a family operation. Folks along Lewiston's main roads wave as Bill, Jr. and Lori each drive their two big Peterbilt Trucks (named "Phil" and "Ruby"), hauling the cattle back and forth from summer to winter pasture. They're a real team, with the same tractors hauling over 1000 tons of hay each late summer and early fall. Lori, who was a professor at Lewis-Clark State College for 15 years, now splits much of her time between her duties as an elected Representative in the Idaho Legislature with her spare time in the office taking care of all the bookwork and spending as much time as possible with their eleven grandchildren.

Bill Jr. and Lori are quick to thank their family and staff (Amanda Coleman, Pete Wittman, Toby Uhlenkott) and dear friends (Luke and Debbie Lowe along with their son, Willson; Brian Jones and Rob Warner; Howard Warner) and many others for all of their help. There's no small amount of pride either, when Bill and Lori mention their appreciation to son Jason for his commitment and dedication to their program.

"Without him," they agree, "we would never have been able to take on this wonderful opportunity. "
